West Coast Regional Council Submission on TTPP Variation 1 – Activities on the Surface of Water

The Council welcomes the opportunity to contribute to the TTPP Variation 1.

Council supports the proposed Variation 1 in relation to Activities on the Surface of Water policy and rules for the Westport and Greymouth port areas. The Variation will enable commercial and port activities on the surface of water to be permitted in the proposed TTPP, and is therefore consistent with the Draft Regional Land Transport Plan 2024-34 (Draft RLTP).

The Draft RLTP sets the strategic direction for land transport in the region and lists the activities recommended by the West Coast Regional Transport Committee for funding from the National Land Transport Fund (NLTF) administered by Waka Kotahi. This includes activities proposed by Waka Kotahi and those proposed by local authorities.

Objective 4 "Connectivity" of the Draft RLTP promotes the use of shipping in the Region as an alternative to road transport. Enabling coastal shipping is a key factor in developing a multi-modal transport network that enables the region to meet its economic, social and cultural needs.

As an alternative for freight movement, coastal shipping can reduce the vulnerability of the road network and therefore reinforce the resilience of the Region. Mode-shift also to reduces carbon emissions and other externalities from road freight.

Recommendation:

The Council supports the TTPP proposed Variation 1 in relation to commercial and port activities on the surface of water in the Westport and Greymouth port areas.
