A gradual deterioration in the road surface in three places changed that and by around 2010 the thunderous roar of North bound heavy vehicles hitting two areas of broken seal and a recessed inspection trap in sequence woke us at 3:45 am and periodically thereafter. This led to a neighbourhood petition to NZTA and Westland District Council. In contrast South bound traffic disturbed us not at all.

The council were quite quick to respond and the trap was adjusted to be flush with the surface. NZTA sent a Fulton Hogan representative. I showed her the problem areas and some months later some encouraging looking white paint marks appeared around them. By then we had become desperate and had retrofitted double glazing to the main bedroom in a vain attempt to get a night's sleep.

A couple of years later the road surface was given a resurfacing which has been very effective even though it only covers the strip where vehicles run, ie not a full road width. I have recently noticed the wet area on the Fitzherbert / Park St intersection beginning to show signs of decay and more white marks have appeared in other places.

Given that one heavy vehicle tyre does as much damage to a road surface as 7 cars, once the sand mining operation gets into full swing it will only be a matter of time before the surface begins to break up.
