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# Land Use Consent WCRC: RC-2023-0133

Mananui is located right on the coast of Westland and is wedged between Tasman Sea and the Mahinapua Creek and does not have great height above sea level.

Westland Mineral Sands Co. Ltd is proposing to remove approximately one thousand tonne of material per day and with operation wanting to run seven days a week and mine this particular area for ten years. That is approximately 3.5 million tonne of material removed from roughly 100 hectares of ground. What does this do to an area that is already only marginally above ground level?

With the proposed mining application and the investment they intend to make on infrastructure/plant etc., a huge concern of ours, as land and property owners adjacent to the possible mine, is expansion. As land owners that have lived in the area for nearly 20 years, we know the ground, its hard-packed sand with a small layer of sandy soil. Once you disturb this ground, you loosen the sand binding and cannot pack it back down as hard as it originally was, and with the removal of some of the proposed minerals this possibility could be even worse.

With predicted sea level rises and the well published risk of an alpine fault earthquake, plus a tsunami risk and liquefaction, the lowering of the ground level and disturbance of the hard-packed sand by this application, seems extremely unwise. But to allow expansion anywhere West of the state highway could be disastrous.

Westland Mineral Sands Co. Ltd will mine the area, remove the material, disturb the hard-packed ground and then leave with their profit. Remaining land-owners will be left to deal with any possible ramifications - which could potentially be significant. If the consent authority grants permission for this application to proceed, we hope they rule out any possibility of expansion and mining anywhere West of the state highway. Any mining in Mananui that involves the removal of large quantities of material and disturbance of the hard-packed sand in our opinion is unwise but allowing it anywhere West of the state highway would be extremely risky to both property and life.

### Water Permit/Discharge Permit WCRC: RC-2023-0133

As most residents of Mananui, we rely heavily on our well for stock water and house water when our tanks run empty, which happens every year, and when it's particularly dry like it was this summer (which we have experienced a few times) they are essential. The applicant is proposing to operate a dredge in the water table 24 hours a day 7 days a week, using large quantities of water to sluice material to and from the plant. We have large concerns about both our water quality being affected and the well level itself being affected. One gold mining operation across the road from us adjacent to the applicants proposed mine fowled our well during a dry spell. Fortunately, the mine stopped operating.

Noise, light and visual aspects of the mine

We have concerns over noise with the applicant proposing to operate a dredge and plant 24 hours a day, seven days a week. During the day, it's not an issue but at night we only hear

wildlife, cows and the ocean (all of which are natural sounds). We are worried that the noise from the plant and dredge will be an unnatural constant, especially when the dredge is allowed 20 metres from properties.

Noise from the trucks and extra vehicles will not be a welcome addition to the area but we feel the houses by the road and through town will be much more affected than us by this.

The visual aspects of both the plant and the mining area will have a huge negative impact on an area that is stunning, with exceptional views along the Southern Alps, it is a popular place for both tourists and locals to take photos and part of an appealing corridor for travellers arriving and departing Hokitika and Westland.

The light from both the plant and dredge will have a negative impact on an area that has very limited light emission at night. We have been able to see and photograph the aurora on several occasions which generally appears above the proposed location of the mine.

### Conclusion

As long-time residents of Mananui, we obviously oppose Westland Mineral Sands Co. Ltd application. There are no positive outcomes for us and other residents of the area, if it goes ahead. Aside from the visual, noise and light negatives, this proposal could see a negative effect on future sales, future subdivision possibilities, a huge effect on our water quality and water levels. But most alarming is the amount of material being removed and ground disturbance which as previously stated, with any future expansion could put the whole area at serious risk from sea level rises, erosion, tsunami and liquefaction.
